SPEAKERS

Prof Martin Knapp

Martin Knapp is a researcher in the areas of health and social care policy and practice. He has been Professor of Social Policy and Director of the Personal Social Services Research Unit at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) since 1996. Since 2009, Martin has also been Director of the School for Social Care Research funded by the National Institute of Health Research. Until early 2014 he was also Professor of Health Economics at the Institute of Psychiatry, King's College London, having established the Centre for the Economics of Mental Health there in 1993.

Martin's research emphases in recent years have primarily been child and adult mental health, dementia, autism and long-term social care, with much of his work having an economic focus. He has published his research widely, including in more than 450 peer-review articles and 15 books. His work has fed through to have a number of impacts on policy and practice discussions in the mental health and long-term care areas, both in the UK and elsewhere.

Mr David McDaid

David McDaid is Research Fellow in Health Policy and Health Economics at LSE Health and Social Care and the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies at the London School of Economics and Political Science. He is co-ordinator of the Mental Health Economics European Network, a 32 country network examining a range of issues, including detailed analysis of the financing of mental health and the socio-economic impact of mental health problems, including aspects of prevention and promotion of good mental well-being.

Other recent research has included evaluation of the first phase of the National Suicide Prevention Strategy in Scotland, the UK wide Healthy Living Centre Initiative, and undertaking a review of the extent to which economic evaluations have been used in public health for the Welsh Assembly Government. He has also co-authored a recent report on the Irish health care system.
